AC is the national college of the Australian Christian Churches, which is a Pentecostal charismatic Christian movement. Although the courses are accessible to students of any background, this course usually attracts those whose personal faith resonates with the College's Pentecostal orientation. The students' motivation to pursue postgraduate research studies ranges from a desire to be trained in a particular specialisation, to personal growth and edification, as well as the acquiring of advanced professional and communication skills.

The postgraduate courses at AC often attract students who have careers in professional fields, studying with the goal of integrating their faith with their vocation. The College's flexible modes of delivery attract a large proportion of students who wish to maintain other commitments while undertaking research work.

The purpose of this Level 9 Masters (Research) program is to equip students to be independent researchers and make a contribution toward advancing knowledge and professional expertise in a variety of academic and professional contexts. The Master of Philosophy (MPhil) will provide a pathway for graduates of AC coursework Masters degrees who wish to pursue further independent research. The MPhil can also function as a pathway into or exit point from the Doctor of Philosophy, providing students have completed the two MPhil coursework subjects and a significant percentage of the thesis component.



The MPhil is a research program designed for graduates with in-depth knowledge and skills, in the field of Theology, Business and/or Education, who want to make an original research contribution to research and research training within academic, church and community settings.

Graduates of the MPhil will have systematic and critical understanding, including a working knowledge of recent developments and approaches in the area of specialisation. Specialisation in Theology will include areas such as Systematic Theology, Biblical Studies, History or Ministry. Specialisation in Business will include areas such as Business, Leadership or Communication. Specialisation in Education will include areas such as Education, Educational Leadership and Theological Education. However, it is anticipated that some students may explore cross-disciplinary areas, such as Theology and Economics.

Graduates will demonstrate specialised knowledge and skills in research using methodologies applicable to their discipline. Advanced skills in critical thinking, communication and creative problem solving of complex issues are demonstrated through independent, original research and scholarship.

Graduates' research will identify, investigate and address an issue within the field of Theology, Business and/or Education, to be presented in a research thesis which will make an original contribution toward the advancement of learning and/or professional practice within the chosen field.



AC GRADUATE ATTRIBUTES

Christian Worldview

A knowledge of the Christian story, derived from the Scriptures and tradition of the church. An awareness of the implications of this story for self-identity in the context of local and global communities. This includes a commitment to engage with alternate worldviews, showing appreciation of the values and perspectives of others.

Leadership

The ability to provide effective Christian leadership to individuals, groups and organisations, demonstrated in the capacity to influence and enable others to accomplish worthwhile objectives which contribute to the human good and the kingdom of God. This includes seeking to emulate the example of Jesus Christ in serving and empowering others.

Integrity and Justice

The ability to apply a Christian worldview in the diverse situations and responsibilities of life, and to exercise faith, hope, love and generosity as prevailing attitudes. This includes the active promotion of the gospel, social justice, equality, mutual respect and an ecological ethos.

Communications

The ability to communicate effectively to a range of audiences, in appropriate contexts using high levels of verbal, written and technological skills. This includes visual and media literacy, numeracy, rhetoric and persuasion.

Personal and Social Skills

Demonstrate relational skills that incorporate the flexibility for both independent and collaborative situations. This includes personal and group organizational skills, conflict management and resolution, as well as the ability to value and respect the opinions of others.

Critical and Creative Thinking

A capacity for critical and reflective thinking that is explored not only individually but within a community context. This includes a capacity to be creative and to research, analyse and resolve problems in innovative and prophetic ways.

Professional Knowledge

Maintenance and use of knowledge about a discipline or field, involving theoretical, conceptual and methodological elements. This includes striving continually and independently to secure further knowledge and where appropriate, defined professional skills.

COURSE STRUCTURE

This course structure applies to students who commence from 2021

The course consists of 120 credit points comprising:

- one core research methods unit (20 credit points)
- one subject at 700 level (20 credit point) to be taken from the area of specialisation
- one core 30,000 word research thesis (80 credit points) in area of specialisation

To qualify for award of the degree of Master of Philosophy a candidate shall complete at least 120 credit points.

ADMISSION CRITERIA

Academic Entry Requirements

Applicants with Recent Secondary Education

This course of study requires the completion of a higher education qualification by an authorised institution. Applicants with recent high school education only are not eligible for direct entry into this course.

Applicants with Vocational Education and Training Study

This course of study requires the completion of a higher education qualification by an authorised institution. Applicants with a Vocational Education and Training (VET) qualification only are not eligible for direct entry into this course.

Applicants with Higher Education Study

Completion of an AQF Level 8 bachelors (honours 1 or 2a) degree in a relevant field, or equivalent.

ΩR

Completion of an AQF Level 7 bachelors degree in a relevant field, or equivalent, as well as an AQF Level 8 graduate diploma in a relevant field with at least a 20 credit point research component and an overall GPA at least 2.8.

OR

Completion of an AQF Level 9 or above postgraduate qualification in a relevant field, or equivalent.

Applicants with Work and Life Experience

In exceptional circumstances the Program Director may recommend that an applicant be admitted who does not have the qualifications specified. In this case, evidence must be supplied to verify that the applicant has equivalent qualifications based on academic and professional attainment and demonstration of an appropriate capacity for the research.

English Language Proficiency

Overseas students are required to demonstrate their English proficiency skills. Such students admitted into our programs must attain an overall IELTS (or equivalent) score of 7.0 (with no score below 7.0 in any of the four skills areas). IELTS (or equivalent) is not required for applicants who have undertaken five years of required higher education study (or equivalent) in English from an approved country or who have completed a Certificate IV or higher qualification awarded in English under the Australian Qualification Framework by an authorised institution or registered training organisation.

Applicants are encouraged to contact the <u>International Student Office</u> if they are unsure of the equivalence of their English language proficiency test scores.

Essential Requirements

A pre-admission interview for all applicants will be conducted by the Program Director and bridging courses may be required.

In exceptional circumstances the Program Director may recommend that an applicant be admitted who does not have the qualifications specified. In this case, evidence must be supplied to verify that the applicant has equivalent qualifications based on academic and professional attainment and demonstration of an appropriate capacity for the research.

Special Admissions Pathways

AC's <u>Admissions Policy</u> details the special admission pathways for our courses of study. The Special Admission Pathways are evaluated on a case-by-case basis by the Program Director. A student's admission requirements may be reconsidered on educational disadvantage grounds, including but not limited to:

- Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander descent, where the normal HSC entry path has not been followed;
- socioeconomic reasons (such as low-family income or poor living conditions);
- learning or language difficulties;
- physical disability;
- serious family illness or excessive family responsibility;
- completion of a prescribed program of non-award study (four subjects or 40 credit points) with an overall GPA of 1.8 or better.

Credit transfers and recognised prior learning (RPL)

You may be entitled to credit for prior learning, whether formal or informal. Formal learning can include previous study in higher education, vocational education, or adult and community education. Informal learning can include on the job learning or various kinds of work and life experience. Credit can reduce the amount of study needed to complete a degree.
