







Gospel Conversations and Alphacrucis University College are delighted to be hosting a two-day conference on the continuing relevance of the early Christian tradition. The conference explores the theological, spiritual, and pastoral insights of the early church, and asks how these insights continue to speak to challenges facing the modern world.







The keynote speaker, John Behr, is Regius Professor of Humanity at the University of Aberdeen and one of the world's leading scholars of early Christian thought. His books include John the Theologian and His Paschal Gospel (2019), Irenaeus of Lyons: Identifying Christianity (2013), The Mystery of Christ: Life in Death (2006), Becoming Human (2013), The Cross Stands While the World Turns (2014), and Formation of Christian Theology (2 volumes, 2001-2004). He has also published translations of some of the most significant works of patristic theology, including Origen's On First Principles (2018), Irenaeus's On the Apostolic Preaching (1997), Athanasius's On the Incarnation (2012), and Gregory of Nyssa's On the Human Image of God (2023).

SPEAKER BIOS



David Adams is a PhD candidate at St Mark's National Theological Centre in Charles Sturt University. He is investigating the way Irenaeus' anthropology could contribute to ethical discourse on human biological enhancement. He holds qualifications in biotechnology and theology, and is experienced in ethical evaluation and commercialising new technology.

Leisa Aitken is a clinical psychologist who has been in clinical practice for nearly 30 years. She is also a regular speaker on the psychology of hope in churches, schools and theological colleges. Her PhD at the University of Sydney developed a new way of conceptualising hope for use in research and therapy. It connects contemporary psychological research with historical interdisciplinary reflections on hope in philosophy, theology and psychiatry. She is co-author of the forthcoming paper, 'The Common Hope Scale: Initial psychometric properties of a new interdisciplinary derived measure of hope,' European Journal of Applied Positive Psychology.

John Behr is Regius Professor of Humanity at the University of Aberdeen and one of the world's leading scholars of early Christian thought. Katherine Chambers is a lecturer in History, Philosophy and Religious Studies at the University of New England. She completed her undergraduate studies at the University of Sydney and her PhD at the University of Cambridge. Her publications include the recent book Augustine on the Nature of Virtue and Sin (Cambridge UP, 2023), and the forthcoming volume Augustine on the Natural Law.

Doru Costache is Associate Professor of Theology at the Australian University of Divinity and Academic Dean of Nisibis Assyrian Theological College. His doctoral studies were in Orthodox at theology at the University of Bucharest in Romania. He has published widely on patristic theology and on Orthodox engagements with science. His recent books include Nature Contemplation in Clement of Alexandria: Elements of the Method (Routledge, 2025) and Humankind and the Cosmos: Early Christian Representations (Brill, 2021).

Andrew Dunstan is Assistant Dean of Bible and Theology, and Lecturer in Christian Thought at Morling College in the Australian University of Theology. He teaches primarily in the fields of systematic theology and Christian social ethics. His doctoral studies were at Oxford University, where he was also a tutor in theology and a Junior Research Associate of the Oxford Centre for Religion and Culture, before serving as Lecturer in Systematic Theology and Church History at Malyon Theological College in Brisbane. His research interests lie at the intersections of epistemology, the doctrine of God, and theological anthropology.

Michael Gladwin is Senior Lecturer in Church History at St Mark's National Theological Centre in the School of Theology, Charles Sturt University. He studied at the Australian National University and the University of Cambridge, and his research interests include the relationship between religion and war in Australian history. His publications include Captains of the Soul: A History of Australian Army Chaplains (2013) and Anglican Clergy in Australia, 1788–1850: Building a British World (2015).

Philip Kariatlis is Sub-Dean and Associate Professor of Theology at St Andrew's Greek Orthodox Theological College. His research interest lies in church doctrine, specifically its existential and salvific character. He has translated a number of academic works (including the doctoral dissertation of Archbishop Stylianos (Harkianakis), titled The Infallibility of the Church in Orthodox Theology, and has published widely on patristic theology and

contemporary Orthodox thought. He was a member of the Faith and Unity Commission of the National Council of Churches of Australia for over a decade and is now chair of the Orthodox Theological Institutions Group of the International Orthodox Theological Association.

Ben Myers is Professor of Theology and Literature at Alphacrucis University College. He has had previous academic roles at the University of Queensland, Charles Sturt University, and Christian Heritage College. He has published on modern theology and the history of Christian thought, including articles on Origen, Augustine, and Greek patristic soteriology. His books include Milton's Theology of Freedom, Christ the Stranger: The Theology of Rowan Williams, and The Apostles' Creed: A Guide to the Ancient Catechism.

Layla Nahavandi is Founder and Director of the Burning Hearts Movement, a global missions organisation dedicated to preaching the gospel and mobilising the church for mission. She holds a Bachelor of Arts in History and International Studies from the University of Adelaide, a Master of Biblical Studies from Alphacrucis University College, and a Master of Historical Theology from the University of Divinity. She is a PhD candidate at Alphacrucis University College, working on Pentecostal engagement with patristic thought.
