COURSE OVERVIEW

The Diploma of Community Services and Diploma of Chaplaincy is a double diploma arrangement that leads to two separate awards in the minimum possible time. The double Diploma of Community Services and Diploma of Chaplaincy provides an introductory body of knowledge and skills in the discipline areas of community services and chaplaincy. The program is designed to produce graduates who can apply integrated technical and theoretical concepts across both fields in a broad range of contexts from a Christian worldview, as well as embody integrity, professional knowledge, and social skills, making a positive contribution to society.

The double Diploma introduces students at a foundation level to the sources and content of both community services and chaplaincy and provides training which emphasises vocational application in community-based and chaplaincy work. Graduates will have cognitive and communication skills to identify and analyse a range of ideas and perspectives in community and pastoral care contexts, specialist technical and creative skills to express those ideas, and will be able to demonstrate an ability to apply a body of knowledge in a range of contexts. Students will perform complex technical operations in real-life community service and chaplaincy contexts with personal responsibility and autonomy and will demonstrate an ability to plan, design, implement and evaluate approaches to community and chaplaincy problems and requirements.

Course Structure

This course structure applies to students enrolled from Semester 2, 2025 onwards.

This dual diploma course structure is based on three semesters (each of 13 weeks duration), with four subjects taught in each semester. It comprises:

- 70 credit points of compulsory core subjects; and
- 50 credit points of electives.

To qualify for award of the dual diploma of Diploma of Chaplaincy and Diploma of Community Services a candidate shall accrue an aggregate of at least 120 credit points, including satisfactory completion of the core subjects noted below.

Work Integrated Learning

Work-Integrated Learning may be undertaken through various Professional Practice and Professional Experience subjects at AC. These subjects seek to create a direct linkage between the learning, skills and values engaged in lectures, and the reflection which occurs when these are applied in real-life settings. These work-based training subjects comprise of instruction, academic assessment and a placement in a workplace for each subject.

To qualify for this course, a candidate will complete at least 1 subject of Professional Practice (placement).
